ALES ON RAILS

Looking for a unique way to celebrate Oktoberfest stateside? Arizona's Verde Canyon Railroad brings its own twist to the German festival Thursday through Sunday all month with its Ales on Rails. The party starts at the train's depot, a 30-minute drive from Sedona and about two hours from Phoenix, where you'll feast on German sausages, sauerkraut, potato salad, pretzels, and strudel. After chowing down, you'll board the train and, while enjoying the beautiful landscape rolling by, sip samples of the 15-plus local brews on tap, which include ales, lagers, porters, and stouts.





NIGHT FALLS ON THE JUNGLE





IN GOOD TASTE



Greasy Spoons

WE SCOURED THE COUNTRY IN SEARCH OF STANDOUT DINERS, SERVING UP THE FEEL-GOOD, DECADENT COMFORT FOODS THAT WE ALL KNOW AND LOVE.

If there's one type of restaurant that can reasonably claim to be the most popular, it's the diner. Affectionately known as greasy spoons for their propensity to serve a generous amount of fatty fried foods, diners have evolved to serve a wide range of good eats. But some things tend to remain a certainty: The food is typically cheap, and the portions generous. Here, we've rounded up some of our favorites from around the country. They're all in destinations with Interval resorts — and if you decide to plan a trip just to have a meal at one of them, we wouldn't blame you one bit.

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NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA: THE CAMELLIA GRILL

You'd be hard-pressed to find a more classic greasy spoon than The Camellia Grill. The diner has been up and running for some 70 years, minus a temporary closure post—Hurricane Katrina. All of the seating is at a luncheonette-style counter that snakes its way around an open-concept kitchen, invoking a real sense of camaraderie among patrons. The servers are known for their friendly demeanors and longevity; the most tenured waiter served for 50 years before his retirement in 1996.

On the Menu: You'll find all the standard, no-frills diner fare; favorites include grilled cheeseburgers; massive, fluffy omelets (especially the chili-drenched kind); and the chocolate pecan pie (a la mode, of course).

LAS VEGAS, NEVADA: VICKIE'S DINER

Located on Las Vegas Boulevard, just north of the Strip, 24-hour Vickie's Diner sits in the corner of a building that has largely been unchanged for the last 60 years. Inside are just a handful of red vinyl seats lined up at a counter, with Tiffany-style lamps hanging from the ceiling, giving it the vibe of a bygone era.

On the Menu: Recently rebranded from its original name, Tiffany's Cafe, Vickie's still serves up the mammoth portions of fuss-free comfort food (think giant one-pound burgers and old-school dishes such as liver and onions) that the location has been making for years. It's also great for breakfast fare, from pillowy omelets slathered in cheese to chicken-fried steak soaked in gravy with eggs.



HISTORY OF THE DINER

The first diner dates back to 1858, when a part-time pressman named Walter Scott decided to supplement his income by selling sandwiches and coffee to late-night newspaper workers in Providence, Rhode Island. The service became so popular that, by 1872, he quit his job to sell food full-time from a horse-drawn carriage.

The idea took off even further, inspiring larger manufacturing companies to begin constructing lunch wagons to sell to would-be vendors. These improved wagons allowed patrons to dine indoors. They proliferated so much, towns and cities began to crack down with new regulations. To circumvent this, owners staked out semi-permanent locations in order to maintain the late hours that made diners so popular in the first place.

By the 1920s, diners had developed a reputation for serving cheap food in less-than-tidy settings. Looking to boost business and appeal to a wider swathe of society (particularly women), many owners cleaned up their establishments and began to offer booth service. Manufacturers added indoor bathrooms and tables to their designs and, looking to impart a more upscale image, adopted the railroadcar look and the term "diner," a nod to dining cars onboard trains. The classic streamline design was introduced in the 1930s, and remains a symbol of Americana today.

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SAN DIEGO, CALIFORNIA: CREST CAFE

This iconic restaurant's personality is apparent before you even walk through its doors: The outside walls are decorated with neon signs and a vibrant mural featuring a large elephant. Inside, however, it's the food on the menu that speaks volumes — Crest Cafe was featured on Food Network's *Diners, Drive-Ins and Dives*.

On the Menu: Breakfast items include indulgences such as creme brulee French toast and the Cabo quesadilla, stuffed with eggs, bacon, cilantro, hash browns, and Monterey Jack cheese. For lunchtime, a popular pick is the insanely decadent butter burger, made with a half-pound of ground beef stuffed with a garlic, tarragon, basil, and parsley butter.

PHOENIX, ARIZONA: MATT'S BIG BREAKFAST

With three locations in Phoenix, Matt's delivers a bit of an upgrade to the traditional diner, and they manage to do it while keeping prices wallet-friendly. Matt's has gotten so much attention, it was also featured on *Diners*, *Drive-Ins and Dives*.

On the Menu: Matt's specializes in typical diner options with elevated ingredients, such as cage-free eggs, house-roasted corned beef, line-caught tuna, and locally sourced organic produce. You'll also find some out-of-the-ordinary plates, such as scrambled eggs with Molinari sopressata salami or a skillet-seared lowa pork rib chop served with eggs and potatoes.



CREST CAFE'S BETTER BUTTER BURGER

Ingredients

Compound Butter

- 1 pound (4 sticks) unsalted butter, softened
- 1 1/2 teaspoons minced fresh basil
- 1 1/2 teaspoons minced fresh parsley
- 1 1/2 teaspoons minced fresh tarragon
- Pinch cayenne pepper
- 2 large cloves garlic, minced
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Roasted Garlic Aioli

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon fresh lime juice
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- 11 small cloves garlic, roasted and chopped

Burgers

- 2 pounds fresh ground beef or four 8-ounce Angus beef patties
- 4 slices cheese
- 4 large burger buns

Directions

For the compound butter: Stir together the butter, basil, parsley, tarragon, cayenne, and garlic; season with salt and pepper. Spoon the mixture onto a piece of plastic wrap in a 6-inch-long mound. Fold the plastic wrap over the mixture to enclose it, and roll it to form a log about 2 1/2 inches in diameter. Chill until firm, about 2 hours.

For the roasted garlic aioli: Blend the mayonnaise, lime juice, paprika, cayenne, cumin, and garlic in a food processor until smooth.

For the burgers: Preheat the oven to broil. Form the ground beef into 4 patties. Stuff a slice of the compound butter inside each and broil the burgers to the desired doneness. Add another slice of the butter to the top of each burger, followed by a slice of cheese. Broil briefly, just until the cheese melts. Serve on buns with a small mound of the aioli on top of the cheese.

BRANSON, MISSOURI: MEL'S HARD LUCK DINER

This '50s-themed eatery stands out among the crowd for its entertaining ambiance: Not only do they serve top-notch comfort foods, but guests are also treated to a show. The restaurant is known for hiring talented musicians — many of whom also perform in the many stage performances Branson is known for — that sing popular classics while they wait on guests.

On the Menu: There's no skimping on portion sizes here. Come for the larger-than-life burgers and an ice cream sundae fit for an entire family: 12 scoops are topped with cookies, bananas, brownie crumbles, hot fudge, and (if you can believe it) more.





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Jewels of the Caribbean

Look beyond the glittering duty-free booty to discover some lesser-known riches of the realm.

reasures abound in the Caribbean. And not just the pirate plunder sometimes claimed from the shipwreck graveyards under the islands' sapphire waters — or the sparkling baubles displayed in the duty-free stores swarmed by cruise passengers. Dig deeper and you're bound to unearth some singular finds unique to the Caribbean — or even to a specific island. Gems found nowhere else. Bangles born from a local artist's inspiration. And, yes, even jewelry made from pieces of eight and gold doubloons. Here are five treasures to shop for in the Caribbean.



1 HOOKED ON LOVE

A clean silver band with a simple hook clasp has been captivating jewelry shoppers in St. Croix for 50 years. Said to be a symbol of love, hook bracelets are sold throughout the island, and even elsewhere in the Caribbean. But sources credit Sonya Ltd. in Christiansted as the originator of the design. The artisans — including Sonya herself — still handcraft the bracelets, which range from spare silver pieces at \$60 to more elaborate 14- and 18-karat-gold designs worth thousands.

2 FOREVER AMBER

Although the semiprecious gem is found in other parts of the world, amber from the Dominican Republic is valued not only because it contains far more fossil inclusions such as insects, but also for its clarity and range of colors, from the classic golden yellow to red and even blue. No wonder jewelrymakers from around the world seek out Dominican amber for their finest pieces. For the lowdown on the story of amber, visit the Amber Museum in Puerto Plata.



3 CONCH PEARLS

Not technically a pearl, this rare treasure is a byproduct of the queen conch. The large mollusk that makes its home in the quintessential pink-lustered seashell is found mostly in the Caribbean, and it's estimated that only one in 10,000 produces a pearl; thus, the typically astronomical prices. Even a single pearl can cost more than \$1,000. The gems are mostly pink — ranging from rose petal to deep coral — and exhibit a wavy sheen that's been likened to watered silk.

4 TRUE BLUE LARIMAR

If you could capture the ocean in a stone, larimar is what it would look like. The rare blue mineral, found exclusively in the Dominican Republic, has only been mined and marketed for a few decades. Larimar ranges from the lightest of blues to deep-sea azure, and its striations seem to mimic the movement of waves — the perfect souvenir to evoke the essence of the Caribbean. Polished stones in settings of silver or gold make for stunning pieces.

5 UNBURIED TREASURE

The Caribbean Sea is awash in shipwrecks, attracting divers with dreams of discovering their fortunes. But prospectors are more likely to strike gold at a shop that specializes in shipwreck jewelry. These retailers sell upcrafted pieces such as pendants fashioned from fragments of old British pottery, and designs that incorporate silver reales recovered from Spanish galleons.

Lake Tahoe Revisited

A ONETIME REGULAR
RETURNS TO HER SUMMER
STOMPING GROUND AND
DISCOVERS FALL HAS
JUST AS MUCH TO OFFER.

was right there, a crab about the size of a silver dollar, and it looked close enough to touch. I leaned my face over the edge of the boat dock at Lollie and Poppy's house, the name I used for my paternal grandparents, and my knees and hands scraped the wooden planks.

"Get closer," said Poppy, standing barefoot behind me. "You can reach it."

He nudged me with his foot, and before I knew it I was splashing in 20 feet of frigid — and impossibly clear, I had just learned — Lake Tahoe water. The crab that had appeared right at my fingertips from the dock was not even anywhere near my toes extending a few feet underwater, and there was no way I was diving down to get it. As I swam to the rocky beach, I could hear Poppy's cackling laugh.

He got me.

I never went to camp; never pulled a prank on the boys' cabin; never took a moonlight canoe trip to capture the flag. But what I did have was Poppy (for pranks) and The Lake, as my family called it, where visits to my grandparents' house in Carnelian Bay meant drinking straight from deep blue waters, cannonballing (and falling) off the dock, skipping rocks, going on boat rides, and the bats that Poppy swore flew overhead at night when I asked to sleep outside on the deck.

My grandparents sold that house in the early '80s, and have both since passed away. Over the years, I have often thought back to those warm, carefree days, but hadn't returned except when there was snow on the peaks and skis on my feet. So on the occasion of my 20th wedding anniversary last fall, we chose to celebrate with a trip to Lake Tahoe, where I rediscovered all the outdoor wonder of my childhood, and incorporated loads of grown-up fun that has me convinced, now more than ever, that Lake Tahoe is timeless.

THE LAKE OF THE SKY

Just 200 miles northeast of San Francisco, and about 45 minutes from Reno-Tahoe International Airport, Lake Tahoe hits you like an oasis would a thirsty traveler, when its glassy expanse of cobalt blue comes into view for the first time. As Mark Twain remarked on his initial glance in his semiautobiographical *Roughing It*, published in 1872, "...as it lay there with the shadows of the mountains brilliantly photographed upon its still surface I thought it must surely be the fairest picture the whole Earth affords."


At 22 miles long and 12 miles wide, Lake Tahoe is the largest alpine lake in North America, and sits astride the California-Nevada border at an altitude of more than 6,200 feet. Some think it's the lofty elevation that precipitated its "The Lake of the Sky" nickname, but for many, including my family and me, the name was always about the blue.

There are numerous scenic overlooks where you can stop and snap a photo along the 72-mile road that circles the lake, but my fall favorite was the Crystal Bay Fire Lookout Trail. From about 800 feet above the liquid surface, Lake Tahoe sprawls like a slab of polished sapphire between pine-carpeted peaks whose inverse image appears painted on the smooth watery canvas. From any perspective, though - north, south, east, or west - the point at which the wall of cobalt water blends into cerulean sky is what blue must have looked like at its genesis, and is one of Lake Tahoe's most unique characteristics.

For my dad, who spent his teen years working summer jobs at a local marina pumping gas and scraping boat hulls, it was the end-of-the-day sky that conjures the most memories.

"I think my favorite times at The Lake were those sunset hours," he says. "They were truly the magic hours and the colors seemed to alter every minute. The sky would be orange, then become red, then fade into blue and deep purple, until the starry sky blanketed us in a nightly dome. It was serenity."

Watching the twilight transition remains a do-not-miss rite of passage, and is easy to do thanks to the dozens of beaches, picnic grounds, and waterfront restaurants and bars situated around the shoreline. Try Sand Harbor or Secret Cove if you want an all-natural setting, or stop in at Chambers Landing, an A-frame cabin that is the oldest bar on Lake Tahoe and perfect for both boat-up and belly-up sunsets.


One evening, my husband and I had dinner and sipped the signature Wet Woody cocktail (a sunset-colored frozen rum drink with a name that nods to the classic wooden boats seen zipping around the lake) at Gar Woods Grill & Pier in Carnelian Bay. The restaurant is just a rock skip from where I used to do the same on my grandparents' beach. And indeed, as my dad recalled, the sky turned 50 shades of pink, orange, and purple while we enjoyed our beverage and chose plates from a menu that includes French onion soup, steaks, and shell pasta with grilled chicken, pancetta, artichoke hearts, and smoked Gouda.

AUTUMN ARRIVAL

While summer in Lake Tahoe can mean traffic jams and two-hour-plus waits for lunch or drinks on popular outdoor dining decks, post-Labor Day is a sort of "secret season," when the sun still shines, but the tables open up and the roads aren't nearly as crowded.

According to my dad, it was always the smell that signaled summer was coming to a close. "The aroma of pine, the pine sap, and the crisp and clean mountain air. It was unmistakable and never forgotten," he says.

I'm not a hardcore outdoors person, but after arriving and getting that first full scent of September, I knew what he meant, and felt an inner twitch to lace up my hiking boots. There are a staggering variety of trails around Lake Tahoe that range from 30-minute, lunch-by-noon walks to all-day, pack-food-and-water treks - and everything in between. We took on the short (a mere 2 miles round-trip) Eagle Falls Trail, which didn't wear us out, but did deliver on scenery thanks to the namesake cascading waterfall.

Before that walk — and, actually, our entire anniversary visit — I would have sworn that the Tahoe sky couldn't get any bluer than it does during the height of summer. Autumn proved me wrong. And paired with the color-changing aspen and cottonwood trees shimmering in shades of red, orange, and gold, the season upped the region's beauty quotient tenfold.

A good hike puts you in the midst of the trees. A fall-foliage drive, however, allows you to see the entire forest. The Mount Rose

witnessing all the golden, reddish panoramas adjacent to the lake, I'm happy to pay the recommendation forward. If you're looking for even loftier views, Lake Tahoe Balloons offers rides through mid-October, and launches right from the water off the upper deck of the catamaran-style Tahoe Flyer.


ON THE WATER

As a kid, I always felt confident jumping from my grandparents' dock and swimming out to a buoy 50 feet offshore. That is until an irrational deep-end-of-the-pool fear kicked in one summer after I asked Poppy how deep the water was.

"Immeasurable," he said, fanning a lifelong rumor in my family that this inland sea's real depth had yet to be discovered. I gulped.

I'd later learn that Lake Tahoe is, in fact, the second-deepest lake in the U.S., with the deepest part measured at 1,645 feet. As an adult, it's not the depth that bothers me, it's the temperature, and

for any similarly minded warm-water wimps, getting *in* the 65-or-so-degree water will be a true challenge. Getting *on* the water, however, is a breeze.

There are sightseeing trips aboard the 312-passenger *Tahoe Queen*, an iconic paddle wheeler, and private outings with Lake Tahoe Boat Rides that are captained by knowledgeable guides. Self-propulsion kayaking and stand-up paddleboarding are more popular than ever, family-friendly, great exercise, and superb ways to explore some of the rocky inlets and beaches carved into the shoreline.

During our visit, my husband and I booked a lunch cruise with Lake Tahoe Bleu Wave. Their 70-foot Burger yacht proved to be an ideal vessel from which to experience scenic Emerald Bay and its oft-photographed Fannette Island, two of the area's most popular picturesque attractions.

LAKE TAHOE REDUX

Before our departure, we stopped by my grandparents' former house. The old sign that hung on Lake Boulevard and once read "Janrick" (for my Aunt Jan and dad, Rick) was gone, and the home was obviously occupied. I knocked, but no one answered, so I left a note, and went around back.

The dock was still there, jutting out from the beach. I scooped up water in my cupped hands and took a sip, then picked up a flat stone and sidearmed it across the surface. *Plop-plop-plunk*. I still had it. Back

on the wooden deck, I looked upward and took a deep breath of pine before walking to the car.

"The air up there in the clouds is very pure and fine, bracing and delicious. And why shouldn't it be? It is the same the angels breathe," Twain once said. I wondered if he was referring to Lake Tahoe.

Just a month before our trip, I'd been reminiscing with my dad and had told him about how I wouldn't sleep on that deck as a kid because of the bats. "There were no bats," my dad confessed. "In the forest, sure, but not around the house. That was just Poppy having some fun with you."

Forty years later, Poppy had got me again. And from somewhere above the deep blue of The Lake of the Sky, up there in those pure and fine clouds, I think I heard his cackling laugh anew.

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A TRAVEL WRITER AND INTERVAL MEMBER EATS AND DRINKS HER WAY AROUND KAUAI.

In Pursuit of 60 NO



I was about to dive into my platter

of fried Pacific shrimp and chips when our bartender, Nat, asked if I wanted some of his "special sauce." It was our second visit to Kauai Island Brewery & Grill, and Nat had steered us right with his menu choices on the first. How could I refuse this offer?

He hurried off into the kitchen and returned carrying a tray loaded with small unlabeled jars filled with red, yellow, and brown sauces, along with containers of ketchup and mayonnaise. My husband, Christian, thought he caught a whiff of Old Bay seasoning. Nat mixed the concoction out of sight below the bar, which only added to the mystery. And then, there it was:

a condiment that looked like ordinary ketchup in a white dipping bowl — yet there was nothing ordinary about the taste.

A few minutes later, he returned to see how we liked it. We didn't just like it, I told him. We *loved* it. He smiled, but we could tell he wasn't surprised. It was, as they say in Hawaii, pure 'ono.


'Ono, with the *okina* (which resembles a left single quotation mark), is the Hawaiian word for delicious — not to be confused with the non-okina ono, which is the Hawaiian name for the wahoo fish. The literal translation means "good to eat." My husband and I had come to Kauai in search of great Garden Isle food and drink, and we weren't disappointed.

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WHERE THE WHALES PLAY

Home base for our visit to Kauai was the Westin Princeville Ocean Resort Villas. Located on the northern side of the island, Princeville is a quiet resort community famous for its golf courses designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr. What makes its greens especially unique is their stunning tropical location, perched on the side of a cliff with dramatic drops to the ocean. The award-winning Makai Golf Club lined our resort, and after the golfers finished for the day, we would stand near the green at Hole 3, gazing at whales breaching in the distant ocean. To us, it looked like kids getting in as much playtime as possible before heading home for dinner at sunset.

THE ART OF THE TIKI DRINK IN PRINCEVILLE

A short walk from the Westin Princeville takes you to Princeville Center. Inside are dozens of shops and eateries, but nothing grabs your attention like Tiki Iniki. The giant, menacing tiki mask hanging near the entrance only hints at its dramatic, true-to-theme interior. Owned and run by Michele Rundgren, wife of rocker Todd Rundgren, what at first may appear to be kitsch is actually a heartfelt homage to classic Hawaiiana. Opened in 2013, the bar area is covered with tiki decor, from statues to posters. Rising above the bartop are numerous bamboo shelves bearing tiki glasses collected by the Rundgrens from their decades of touring the world.

Open for lunch and dinner, Tiki Iniki's menu puts a Hawaiian-Asian spin on upscale pub food. Its most famous menu item is the grilled Iniki burger, praised for its tantalizing combination of juicy beef and that love-it-or-hate-it Hawaiian "delicacy" Spam. Hawaiians love spam. (The nearby Foodland Princeville grocery store offers a large selection.) And the Iniki burger has plenty of it: The half-pound patty stuffed with chunks of spam packs a super-salty punch, and is topped with provolone, onion compote, pickled jalapenos, cabbage slaw, and shoyu (soy sauce) mayo. Served with fries, this burger is so big, it took two drinks to wash down.

Tiki Iniki is also the place to go for classic Hawaiian cocktails. I began with the Trader Vic's mai tai, served in a teal tiki glass that you can take home. Tiki Iniki's version of the mai tai is made up of Appleton Estate V/X rum 80, fresh-squeezed lime, orange Curaçao, and toasted-almond syrup. The cocktail had a bit of bite from the rum and tang from the fruit. My second was The Iniki, made with El Dorado 3- and 5-year rums, passion fruit, vanilla syrup, freshly squeezed lemon, and pineapple and orange juices. Served in a red tiki glass, the melange is garnished with a tiny

paper umbrella turned inside out to represent the hurricane the bar is named after. The taste is so sweet, you could drizzle it on toast like jam.

POST-HIKE SEAFOOD IN HANALEI BAY

Just a few switchbacks down the ridge from Princeville and across a one-lane bridge is a breathtaking scene that's reason enough to visit the Garden Isle. Kissed by clear waters and backed by verdant, misty mountains, crescent-shaped Hanalei Bay is where the North Shore's winter surfing is at its best. Kayakers, wind surfers, and hikers all flock here year-round. If you look out into the distance, you can spot Makana Mountain, best-known as the fictional isle of Bali Hai in 1958's *South Pacific*.

Christian and I began our day in Hanalei bright and early with a 4-mile hike along a portion of the Kalalau Valley Trail in nearby Ha'ena State Park. Most travelers undertake the first portion of this StairMaster-like

trek from Ke'e Beach to the popular (but too dangerous for swimming) Hanakapiai Beach. Only the truly intrepid tackle the entire 11 miles of trail.

Having worked up a sweat, we knew just what would hit the spot: cold beer and freshfrom-the-Pacific seafood. So we headed toward small, tranquil Hanalei Town, nestled just off the bay. A stroll along Kuhio Highway, the town's main street, led us to The Hanalei Gourmet.

Located in a restored schoolhouse with dramatic waterfall-streaked peaks for a backdrop, the popular eatery serves an ample selection of salads and sandwiches for lunch, and pastas, burgers, and other entrees for dinner. They'll even pack a picnic for you — just ask.


A wall-sized chalkboard decorated with a mermaid provided the day's specials, from which I chose the marlin fish and chips. Hanalei beer batters and deep fries its fish to golden perfection, served alongside fries, Asian coleslaw, and soy-wasabi sauce. Christian had the fish sandwich, which comes charbroiled on a toasted bun, topped with lemon-caper-dill mayonnaise and "the works" (lettuce, tomato, sweet red onion, and sprouts). Both were so fresh, the delicate meat flaked into tiny pieces. We paired our meal with chilled cans of Maui Brewing's Mana Wheat, infused with Maui Gold pineapples.

MORE HANALEI: HAPPY HOUR, HAWAIIAN STYLE

While best known for its daytime attractions, Hanalei is also a great place to experience what Hawaiians call *pau hana*, or after-work time. (We call it happy hour on the mainland.) Once again we walked


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


down Kuhio Highway, and this time a bright orange sign with a Kokopelli (a humpbacked, flute-playing fertility deity) caught our eye. Housed in a deep-blue structure that looks like a beach cottage, Kalypso Island Bar & Grill beckons with its outdoor porch seating, bamboo bar, and self-proclaimed "Coldest Beer on the North Shore."

It's not happy hour without something to munch on, so Christian and I shared a huge platter of macho nachos: fresh tortilla chips piled high with black beans, cheese, olives, tomatoes, jalapenos, green onions, sour cream, and your choice of meat or seafood. Being in Hawaii, we ordered it topped with succulent Hawaiian kalua pig. Kalua is the Hawaiian word describing the method of slow cooking in a Hawaiian imu, or underground steam oven, which makes for a smoky, tender meat. The platter was so big, it became our dinner. We washed it all down with some hoppy IPAs from Oregon's Deschutes Brewery.

Feeling full, we walked off our meal with a shopping excursion through Ching Young Village. Located at the corner of Kuhio Highway and Aku Road, the popular retail center includes a shave-ice shop

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and a nut roaster that sells, among other treats, a dozen varieties of flavored macadamia nuts. We left with an armful of souvenirs: board shorts that made us look like surfers (even though we're not), Hanalei Bay T-shirts (so we could boast of our visit back home), and a small black-lacquer surfboard with a carved turtle motif.

BEER FLIGHTS IN PORT ALLEN

As beer enthusiasts, we couldn't visit western Kauai without a stop at Kauai Island Brewery & Grill — known as the world's westernmost brewery — in the harbor town of Port Allen. Most of the boat tours in Kauai are based here, so whether you enjoy sport fishing, scuba diving, or just want a spectacular view of Napali Coast from the water, this is where you start. In the midst of all the tour and dive shops is a large metal building that houses the brewery. Often guests will dine here after a day out on the water, only to see the captain and crew of their boat having a post-work beer. Bartender Nat (the creator of the aforementioned magical mystery sauce) suggests that if they did a good job, you should buy them a round.

Nat walked us through a beer sampling with several "tasters,"

which are smaller pours (in this case, five ounces) so guests can try different brews before committing to a pint. I favored the Westside Wheat, an American-style filtered wheat ale made with equal parts wheat and malted barley. It paired nicely with the ahi *poke*, fresh sashimi-style seasoned tuna. Christian, a hops lover, preferred Captain Cook's IPA, which he used to wash down a chili–kalua pork wrap. Nat says the brewery's most popular beer is the Lilikoi Ale, a lighter beer with a hint of passion fruit. The taste is Garden Isle in a glass.

ISLAND-INSPIRED BREWS IN LIHUE

Located on the island's east side, Lihue is its business center, home to the main airport where most visitors land. Before our return to the mainland, we stopped at Kauai Beer Company for one last pau hana. Jim Guerber, owner, founder, and long-time home brewer, opened KBC in 2013 with his son Justin. Guerber has lived on Kauai for more than 20 years and uses Kauai lore in the names of the beers and even the brewery's logo, a rooster. After Hurricane Iniki, the 1992 Category 4 storm that devastated






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the island, farm hens and roosters escaped their pens and no one bothered to recapture them, Guerber says. It's not uncommon to see chickens alongside highways, running through parks and checking backpacks on beaches for snacks.

Munching on soft Bavarian pretzels with spicy mustard, we enjoyed the brewery's signature brew, Black Limousine, a Bavarian Schwarzbier that is rich and smooth with hints of caramel and toffee. We finished our visit sipping a Lihue Lager, a Munich Helles lager made with tropical hops for a Kauai take on a traditional brew. It was a perfect end to our week in paradise — more 'ono. ■






AN ANGLOPHILE'S GUIDE TO

BARBADOS





Where to take your tea, admire architecture, and catch a cricket match on this most British of the Caribbean isles. BY DIANA LAMBDIN MEYER



laimed in the name of King James I in 1625, Barbados was originally named Little England.

Throughout the centuries, the nickname has endured — for good reason. From history and architecture to sports and cuisine, Barbados (or B'dos, as the residents call their homeland) is a destination admirers of English culture will surely adore.

BITS AND BOBS

For more than three centuries, Barbados was a British colony, its most enduring presence in the Caribbean until the 1960s, when the little island and many others in the region gained their independence from the Crown. Its Parliament was established in 1639, making Barbados the third-oldest parliamentary democracy in the Commonwealth. Today, it is broadly recognized as the most British of the Caribbean islands.



Be sure to catch the weekly changing of the sentry, a ceremonial reproduction of what once was a frequent routine at the former British military post.

Yet, technically, Barbados is not in the Caribbean. It is the farthest east of the Lesser Antilles in the West Indies and is surrounded by the Atlantic Ocean. The east coast receives breezes across 3,000 miles of open water that some say is the freshest air on the planet. The west side of the island, which is just 21 miles long and 14 miles wide, is greatly influenced by the calm waters of the Caribbean, but still, it's the Atlantic that you'll dip your toes in here.

Of course, English (with a touch of African patois) is the official language, and the local lingo includes many of the British expressions that make most Anglophiles swoon. Sometimes it's just the smallest of things, such as calling an elevator a lift or a television a telly, or your presence in Barbados a holiday rather than a vacation. And, of course, it's not what they say so much as how they say it. Even while on crowded roadways, where automobiles are on the left, there is a sense of courtesy and dignity that remains consistent with their British heritage.

One other note — the people of Barbados call themselves Bajans, and invite you to do so as well.

BARBADOS' BRITISH ARCHITECTURE

To kick off your Anglophile explorations, it's only appropriate to start where the first British settlers came ashore on Barbados' western coast. Originally named Jamestown in homage to their king, today the area is known as Holetown, a nod to the small channel known as "The Hole" where incoming ships once dropped anchor. An obelisk near the police station memorializes the inaugural English arrival.

Anyone intrigued by history or architecture will want to spend some time taking in Holetown's St. James Parish Church. Surrounded by massive mahogany trees and an ancient cemetery with moss-covered headstones, the light-stone structure stands on the oldest piece of consecrated land on the island, lovingly called "God's Acre" by parishioners. First constructed of wood in 1628, the church has gone through multiple rebuilds in the wake of destructive hurricanes. Its current structure dates to 1874, but the original church bell, cast in England in 1696, remains to this day. Parishioners modestly note that their bell is 162 years older than the bell at London's Palace of Westminster.

For a uniquely Caribbean-British melding of architectural styles, set aside some time to admire the vibrant little shopping area of Chattel Village. Also in Holetown, this open-air retail hub's stores are built in the style of plantation chattel houses. In the early days of colonization, these compact wooden working-class homes were built to be quickly disassembled and moved to another plantation as workers followed the crops. Despite their original simplicity, they are painted in bright colors and decorated with Victorian architectural features such as ornate fretwork and carved-wood banisters.

On the other end of the architecture spectrum, take in where Barbados' more monied citizens once lived on a stroll through Speightstown, the second-largest community on the island. You'll find many original British colonial structures, once home to the island's wealthy merchant class. Located in St. Peter parish, Speightstown

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carries the nickname "Little Bristol" because of the historic shipping route directly from Speightstown to Bristol, England.

Yet none of Speightstown's historic buildings can hold a candle to the elegant circa-1650 St. Nicholas Abbey, also in St. Peter Parish. One of only three remaining Jacobean mansions in the Western Hemisphere, the Abbey sits atop Cherry Tree Hill, the second-highest point on the island. The Great House and grounds are a majestic showcase of Jacobean, Tudor, and Georgian architectural styles. The first floor of the Great House is filled with period furnishings and family portraits, and is open to the public for guided tours. Once a massive sugar plantation, the property includes a rum distillery and steam press: visitors can purchase the plantation's signature rum at the on-site gift shop.

HISTORIC BRIDGETOWN, PARLIAMENT, AND TRAFALGAR SQUARE

With a population of about 110,000, Bridgetown is a bustling little city with an energy that outpaces its size. Street vendors peddling fresh produce and snow cones blend with tourists shopping duty free and downtown employees working to keep a country moving.

Take plenty of time to roam the streets of Bridgetown, particularly Broad Street, where goods that appeal to the islanders' British heritage are tucked away in any number of grocery and department stores. You might discover a fine selection of English teas and jams for your afternoon indulgence, as well as other imported British goods.

But don't spend all your time shopping: Tucked in alongside multistory office buildings and commercial centers are historic buildings that date to the island's earliest inhabitants. The military garrison and much of Bridgetown, including the Parliament, were named a UNESCO World Heritage site in 2012. A fun time to visit the garrison is on Thursday for the weekly noontime changing of the sentry. A drum corps, clothed in colorful uniforms originally decreed by Queen Victoria for the West India Regiments in 1858, leads the procession and keeps time during the high-stepping ceremony. Buckingham Palace it's not, but it's still an impressive event.

Stroll along the banks of the Constitution River until you reach Upper Broad Street and National Heroes Square, formerly known as Trafalgar Square. Among the many heroes immortalized here is Admiral Lord Nelson, who also has a statue in his name at London's Trafalgar Square. However, the Bajans quietly point out that this particular statue was unveiled in 1813, just eight years after the 1805 Battle of Trafalgar, a good 30 years before the similar honor in London.

On the other side of Broad Street you'll find Parliament, a series of buildings that showcase neo-Gothic architecture and the governing influence of Great Britain over modern-day Barbados. To learn more about how a parliamentary form of government operates, visit the Parliament Museum and National Heroes Gallery in the West Wing for a surprisingly interesting presentation.

AFTERNOON TEA AND OTHER BRITISH FARE

Few experiences for an Anglophile on holiday are as immersive as the food and drink native to the U.K. And on Barbados, traditional afternoon tea is as common and popular as rum punch on the beach. Finding a place to enjoy your cup of Earl Grey and scones with clotted cream is not at all trying.

To sip tea in a picturesque historic setting, visit St. Philip parish's Sunbury Plantation House, a more than 300-year-old grandly furnished great house that is open for touring. A lovely courtyard is the setting for afternoon tea, complete with freshly baked scones, mini sandwiches, and sliced cake.

Another excellent choice is Baian Blue, the restaurant inside St. James parish's Sandy Lane Hotel, which serves a classic English tea on an elegant terrace shaded by mahogany trees. Although the



setting is undeniably Caribbean, the finger sandwiches and delicate pastries served on tiered trays are undeniably British.

Looking for something a bit more substantial? Patisserie Bistro Flindt, in Holetown, offers a "Full-On" English breakfast, including sausages, bacon, eggs, roasted tomato, mushrooms, and baked beans served with toast. And in Christ Church parish's St. Lawrence Gap, the Bay Bistro offers a "Full Monty" British breakfast daily and a roast beef and Yorkshire pudding special on Sundays.

For sweets lovers, The Tides Restaurant in Holetown is an excellent destination for a nice evening out or a special lunch where you'll find the best sticky pudding on the island.

SPORTS AND BARS TO WATCH THEM IN

Looking for a great bar to cheer on your favorite team in an English Premiere League match or other live sporting event? There are plenty of TVs to go around at Bert's (24 flat screens, to be exact), showing international sports coverage both indoors and poolside. Known for its banana daiquiris and relaxed island feel, this Christ Church parish hotspot's menu includes traditional Bajan dishes, sandwiches, and stone-fired pizzas. And you won't go thirsty: Choose from a selection of frozen drinks and beers, including buckets of Banks, which is brewed on Barbados.

Also in Christ Church parish, Bubba's Sports Bar & Restaurant is another popular pick, with three 10-foot screens plus 12 additional TVs. Its massive drinks menu runs the gamut from signature cocktails and margaritas to beers, wines, and shooters. Food options include plenty of appetizers, and sliders, burgers, seafood, and steaks.

If you want to enjoy live spectator sports popular with the Brits, find your way to Kensington Oval, just outside of Bridgetown in St. Michael Parish. As early as 1895, this field hosted an English touring team. Over the decades, the legendary names of cricket have played here, including Barbados' own Sir Garfield Sobers, who is widely recognized as the best cricketer to have ever played the game. Daily tours of Kensington Oval will help you better understand the game and the passion behind it.

You'll also want to make time for a visit to the Cricket Legends of Barbados, an unexpectedly high-tech museum across the street from Kensington Oval that explains the game, its history, and its heroes. Guided tours are available Monday through Friday.

Of course, there are additional cricket grounds all about the island. If you see a game in progress, pull over and watch, just like the locals.

The same is true if you see a polo match underway. The most prominent fields are Holder's Field in St. James, and Lion Castle and Clifton Polo Field, both in St. Thomas. Prince Charles and his son Prince Harry have played at the exclusive Apes Hill Polo Club. The polo season on the island typically runs January to May, but special events and private lessons are possible throughout the year.

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Parts of Switzerland's mountainous terrain are inaccessible to cars, but can easily be reached with other modes of transportation.



Ascend (by rail, of course) to the lofty Sphinx Observatory crowning the Jungfrau peak.

you're not used to public transportation being so good that you prefer to leave the car behind, you are in for a treat in Switzerland. Millions of residents don't even own a car because they rely on the Swiss Travel System of trains, buses, and boats yes, people even commute via waterways. You will find all the modes of transportation to be clean, comfortable, and, most importantly, integrated so that everything connects to provide a seamless and stress-free journey. The wonderful canary-yellow PostBuses drop you off right outside train stations and provide quick connections. Nearly everyone speaks English, so you can always ask for help though signage is usually a model of common sense. And all systems run on time like the proverbial Swiss watch.

There is hardly a dull rail journey in Switzerland — even some commuter trains pass through scenery that people travel halfway around the world to see. Here are six magnificent rail day-trips around three popular resort areas: Flims, Lenzerheide, and Wengen. And even assuming start times no earlier than 8:00 a.m., all will get you back to your resort in time for supper.

FROM FLIMS Steam Over the Furka Pass

Catch a bus to the award-winning (really!) bus station at Chur, and descend the escalators for a train to Realp. This takes you along part of the route of the famous Glacier Express, which runs between St. Moritz and Zermatt. The whole journey takes eight hours, but you will enjoy one of the best sections on your ride to Realp.

After crossing over the confluence of the two Rhine tributaries, you follow the Vorderrhein headstream through the spectacular Ruinaulta gorge,

known as the Swiss Grand Canyon, where great cliffs of white limestone tower over the line. The train climbs from pasture into more rugged country, passing the huge white monastery at Disentis. The source of the Rhine is close to the 6,670-foot summit of the line at the wild Oberalp Pass and the start of a dizzying descent via a series of dramatic U-shaped curves down to the ski resort of Andermatt.

The train continues to Realp, where it is a short walk to the station of the Dampfbahn Furka-Bergstrecke (DFB), a steam-powered historic railway that climbs at fierce gradients to the Furka Tunnel and drops down through a spiral tunnel to Oberwald. The DFB operates

a relatively short season, so be sure to check dates and times.

From Oberwald, take the train back through the lower-level Furka Base Tunnel to Chur and the PostBus back to Flims.

Paddling on Lake Lucerne

This day-trip requires a few changes and may appear complicated, but like all Swiss journeys, it's much simpler than it sounds. Take a bus to Chur for a train to Thalwil past the lovely lake waters of Walensee, backed by sawtooth mountains. At Thalwil, take the train to Zug and change to the route to Flüelen. A few minutes' walk from

the station is the pier for the boats on mountain-ringed Lake Lucerne, five of them vintage paddle steamers from the early 20th century.

Consult a timetable of the day's boat trips and work out how far you can go, perhaps having lunch on board, before returning to Flüelen midafternoon. Take the train south through the famous spirals and loops of the Gotthard Pass to Göschenen. Beside the station is the platform for the narrow-gauge rack train that grinds its way through the Schöllenen Gorge past the Devil's Bridge to Andermatt.

To return, take the train through Disentis to Ilanz, where a bus from

The Swiss Railways website is outstanding: log on to sbb.ch/en, key in your start and end points, and it will give you all the bus, train, or boat times, including platform numbers and any walking time between them — usually just a few minutes.

outside the station will deliver you through the snowboarding paradise of Laax and then home to Flims.

FROM LENZERHEIDE Take the High Road

This day of PostBus and train journeys takes you over elevated passes among the mountains of Graubünden, and allows you plenty of time to have lunch and explore in the celebrated resort town of St. Moritz. The mountain passage known as Julier Pass is so altitudinous that buses can only operate from early June to mid-October; in high season (July and August), it's advisable to book a seat in advance on the website, postbus.ch.

Pick up the Julier Pass Route PostBus at the Lenzerheide Post stop on its way to St. Moritz; no changes are required. Besides St. Moritz's upmarket shops, there is the Segantini Museum, showcasing a fine collection of pictures by this internationally renowned landscape painter.

Make the return journey by train on one of only three UNESCO World Heritage—site railway lines in the world, the section of the narrow-gauge Rhaetian Railway over the Albula Pass. The descent from the summit tunnel down through a series of spiral tunnels and corkscrew viaducts is breathtaking. On arrival at Chur, ascend the escalators to the bus station for a bus back to Lenzerheide.

Adrenaline Rush

Here are two activities that will practically guarantee a good night's sleep after a day of excitement and fresh air. Take the bus to Chur and a train toward Brig as far as llanz, where the river rafts of Swissraft (swissraft.ch) take to the waters of the Vorderrhein. Donning a wet suit, life jacket, and helmet, you board a blue rubber raft, wriggling one foot into a floor-mounted strap as an anchor.

You will have seen the milky cliffs and peculiar contortions of the Ruinaulta gorge from the train on the way to llanz, but the views from the water provide a different appreciation for its beauty.

The half-day paddle comes to an end at Reichenau-Tamins,

where there is a station for trains back to Chur.

From there, take the bus to Lenzerheide. Or, if you are still up for more thrills, get off the bus at Churwalden Post and walk a short way through the village to the Suspension Rope Park on Pradaschier Mountain and the adjacent rail-mounted dry toboggan run. On this 2-mile track, you'll hurtle down the mountain through a series of canted U-bends and rollercoaster drops.

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FROM WENGENThe Top of Europe

This is the advertising slogan of the railway to the highest station in Europe, Jungfraujoch, at 11,332 feet above sea level. It is simplicity itself to reach the station: From Wengen, narrow-gauge rack trains claw their way up the mountain to Kleine Scheidegg on a saddle in the mountains beneath the Eiger summit. There passengers move to an adjacent train for an extraordinary tunnel journey. Two stops along the way allow passengers to gaze through a picture window in the tunnel at the impressively steep north wall of the Eiger.

This is one of the most remarkable railway tunnels in the world, having taken 16 years to bore and opening in 1912. From the unlined rock cavern where trains terminate, lifts take passengers to different levels at the Jungfrau peak. Visit open-air platforms and the Sphinx Observatory, which has a glazed observation hall to give views in all directions and down the gently curving 14-mile Aletsch glacier. Don't miss the Ice Palace, a vast cavern of wildlife ice sculptures and other exhibits.

Bond on the Slopes

This excursion takes you to the Schilthorn, the peak from which George Lazenby and Diana Rigg set off skiing in one of the most thrilling sequences of the James Bond film *On Her Majesty's Secret Service*.

Take the train from the car-free resort of Wengen down to Lauterbrunnen. Walk through the short tunnel to the cable car for Grütschalp, followed by the train along the cliffs to another car-free resort, Mürren. The views of the Eiger, Mönch, and Jungfrau summits are superb.

A walk through the attractive village brings you to the cable car station for the Schilthorn. Part of the pleasure of a trip up the mountain is the panoramic views from the Piz Gloria revolving restaurant, which doubled as the lair of Bond's nemesis.

Retrace your steps to return to Wengen.
